

Satchel Paige was one of the greatest baseball pitchers of all time, known for his incredible skill, showmanship, and long career. He played during the era of segregation, when African American players were barred from Major League Baseball, so most of his early career was spent in the Negro Leagues. Despite this barrier, Paige became a legend and eventually broke into the Major Leagues at an age when most players had already retired.

In 1948, at the age of 42, Satchel Paige finally got the chance to play in the Major Leagues. He joined the Cleveland Indians, becoming the oldest rookie in MLB history. A *rookie* is a first-year player. Despite his age, he pitched brilliantly and helped the team win the World Series that same year.

Paige's career was remarkable for its length. He pitched for more than five decades, from the 1920s into the 1960s. His longevity amazed fans and players alike, and he became a symbol of endurance. *Longevity* means lasting a long time, especially in a career or activity.

In addition to his athletic ability, Paige was known for his humor and wisdom. He often shared sayings called "Satchelisms." One of his most famous was: "*Don't look back.*"

*Something might be gaining on you.*” These playful yet thoughtful quotes added to his legend.

In 1971, Satchel Paige was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame, making him one of the first players from the Negro Leagues to receive this honor. The Hall of Fame recognizes the best and most influential players in baseball history. His induction was a sign of respect for both his achievements and the talent of many players who had been excluded because of racism.

Paige passed away in 1982, but his legacy remains strong. He is remembered as one of the most entertaining and skilled pitchers to ever play the game. His story also reminds people of the struggles and triumphs of African American athletes during segregation.
